

MESSAGE FROM MONSIGNOR LAUDATO SI PARA 93-95

In a culture that glorifies individual rights to such a high degree as ours, concern about environmental responsibility can be problematic. There has always been a tension between respecting private property and serving the common good. Pope Francis acknowledges that the Church has respected to the right of individual to own private property. He quotes Saint John Paul II to affirm that this right is not absolute or inviolable. The right to property is subject to the common plan of God. The implications of this is that both rich and poor have an equal dignity. Every person has a natural right to have enough to provide basic support for themselves. He emphasizes this includes not just property but access to technical education, credit, insurance and markets. A further implication is that the natural environment is also a collective good. This places a severe responsibility on the minority who have control over the resources of the world. He notes the question is it not robbery or even murder if twenty percent of the world's population prevent the rest of the world from basic survival by keeping control of the world's resources for themselves.

VI. THE COMMON DESTINATION OF GOODS

93. Whether believers or not, we are agreed today that the earth is essentially a shared inheritance, whose fruits are meant to benefit everyone. For believers, this becomes a question of fidelity to the Creator, since God created the world for everyone. Hence every ecological approach needs to incorporate a social perspective which takes into account the fundamental rights of the poor and the underprivileged. The principle of the subordination of private property to the universal destination of goods, and thus the right of everyone to their use, is a golden rule of social conduct and "the first principle of the whole ethical and social order".[71] The Christian tradition has never recognized the right to private property as absolute or inviolable, and has stressed the social purpose of all forms of private property. Saint John Paul II forcefully reaffirmed this teaching, stating that "God gave the earth to the whole human race for the sustenance of all its members, without excluding or favouring anyone".[72] These are strong words. He noted that "a type of development which did not respect and promote human rights - personal and social, economic and political, including the rights of nations and of peoples - would not be really worthy of man".[73] He clearly explained that "the Church does indeed defend the legitimate right to private property, but she also teaches no less clearly that there is always a social mortgage on all private property, in order that goods may serve the general purpose that God gave them".[74] Consequently, he maintained, "it is not in accord with God's plan that this gift be used in such a way that its benefits favour only a few".[75] This calls into serious question the unjust habits of a part of humanity.[76]

94. The rich and the poor have equal dignity, for "the Lord is the maker of them all" (Prov 22:2). "He himself made both small and great" (Wis 6:7), and "he makes his sun rise on the evil and on the good" (Mt 5:45). This has practical consequences, such as those pointed out by the bishops of Paraguay: "Every campesino has a natural right to possess a reasonable allotment of land where he can establish his home, work for subsistence of his family and a secure life. This right must be guaranteed so that its exercise is not illusory but real. That means that apart from the ownership of property, rural people must have access to means of technical education, credit, insurance, and markets".[77]

95. The natural environment is a collective good, the patrimony of all humanity and the responsibility of everyone. If we make something our own, it is only to administer it for the good of all. If we do not, we burden our consciences with the weight of having denied the existence of others. That is why the New Zealand bishops asked what the commandment "Thou shall not kill" means when "twenty percent of the world's population consumes resources at a rate that robs the poor nations and future generations of what they need to survive".[78]



LOUISIANA FLOODS

Bishop Folda in response to the USCCB has decided to ask for a second collection in our parishes on the weekend of Sept 17 & 18 for the people who are suffering from the floods in Louisiana. There is no special envelope so this will be a distinct second collection. For us in this area this is not merely charity but really an act of justice. We must remember how in 1997 when Grand Forks was flooded, the people of the US gave two million dollars to the parishes in Grand Forks helping our diocese to recover. So immediately after the first collection on that weekend, the baskets will be passed a second time for the Louisiana Flood victims.

DRIVING MONSIGNOR

You may recall that as a result of my Pituitary Apoplexy in June 2014, I have not been able to drive because of the damage to my optic nerve. For a few months Deacon Wally Dalman drove me but he had to return to his responsibilities in the Parish Cluster of Cooperstown. At that time Marion Baker volunteered to find drivers to bring me to St. Agnes on the 1st, 3rd and 5th Sundays of the month. She has performed a valiant effort organizing parishioners to make sure I have been able to make it to the early Mass at St. Agnes. I and Our Lady of Peace should be very grateful for her service during this time. Without her help and those who responded to her requests, I would not have been able to remain at Our Lady of Peace and St. Agnes. Marion has now asked that the Parish Council take over organizing drivers. At our discussion at the Council we set a goal of having drivers planned ahead of time for a year. The driver for a given weekend would be published in the bulletin just as Liturgical Ministers are. To this we will need the help of most parishioners. Ideally, there should be enough persons capable of driving me to St. Agnes, that no one would have to drive me more than once or twice a year. To begin with we would ask that if you would be willing to drive me, contact David Groven at 701-367-0941 or Robbie Tangen at 701-388-1691. The responsibility is simply that you would pick me up by 7:45 AM and drive me to St. Agnes (a 30-minute trip) on a given Sunday (one of the 1st, 3rd or 5th Sundays of the month). As a side benefit the people of St. Agnes always provide a breakfast after the 8:30 Mass (sometimes simply coffee and rolls, occasionally egg bakes or something in that order). By calling David or Robbie you can save the Council some work from having to call parishioners to assist.
