MESSAGE FROM MONSIGNOR - WHAT IS A HOMILY

In a newsletter from Assumption Abbey in Richardton ND Abbot Brian Wangler wrote an article with this title. I thought it was a good reflection on what a homily is about not just for me as a preacher but also for you as a People meeting God in the Eucharist. He notes that many of his thoughts are inspired by Pope Francis in his Apostolic Exhortation *Evangelii Gaudium* (*The Joy of the Gospel*)

“According to Pope Francis, a homily is a dialogue between God and his people, facilitated by the homilist. It is not a dialogue where the homilist says something and then the congregation says something. Only the homilist speaks but the congregation does more than listen: it engages God along with the preacher. In the Scripture readings of Mass, some aspect of God is opened. The homilist puts it into the context of the rest of Scripture and Tradition and applies it to our life. Does this sound like too much to ask for from a congregation and its pastor/deacon when they are gathered for Sunday Mass? For a dialogue between God and his people to happen, both the homilist and the congregation have to believe that such a dialogue is desirable and would like to see it happen. I cannot imagine anyone saying no. But a dialogue between God and the people, facilitated by the homilist is not going to happen automatically. Three requirements have to be in place.”

“First both the homilist and the congregation have to be serious about God. Both need faith. One might think that it is the homilist's job to get people to be concerned about the things of God, and there is a lot of truth to that. However, it is not the whole story because the people that form the congregation also have a contribution to make. Both have to be engaged by God.”

“Second, both the homilist and the congregation have to be aware that a homily is a dialogue between God and his people, facilitated by the homilist. It is not a conversation like any other. Actually, the Holy Spirit is the homilist and he is the one engaging the minds and hearts of the congregation mainly through the homilist. This creates a special dialogue about God that forms a unity between the homilist and congregation. The homily is part of the Liturgy of the Word where, after hearing God speak to us through Scripture, we take time to reflect on it and heed its call to conversion. When the people and the homilist reflect on how the Scripture readings call them to conversion and on how the rest of Mass fosters such conversion, then a special unity is formed between the homilist and the congregation. The homily cannot be thought of only in human terms, such a performance by the one preaching. It is the work of the Holy Spirit who brings priest and congregation together on Sunday morning to hear the word of God as they celebrate and apply to their lives the greatest even and gift the world has ever known, namely, the passion, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. While God the Holy Spirit engages us during the whole Mass, he does so in a different way during the homily. Here God's Word contained in Scripture is read to us and, in that way, placed before us so we might consider its meaning and application to our lives. Even though a homily is a dialogue between God and his people, it is the homilist who is required to do much more preparation.”


Trail County School Supply Drive
